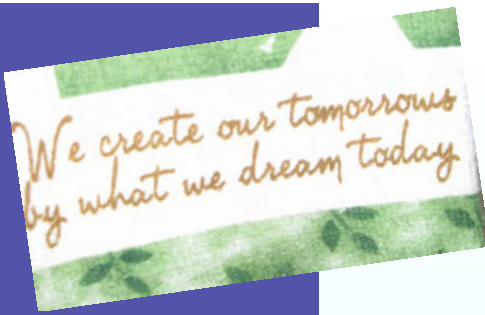

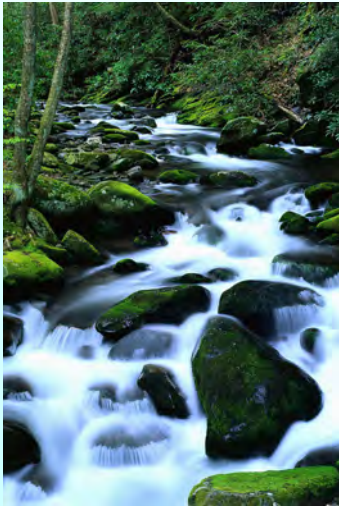
Marjorie and Argyle never had any children. They worked hard and played hard.

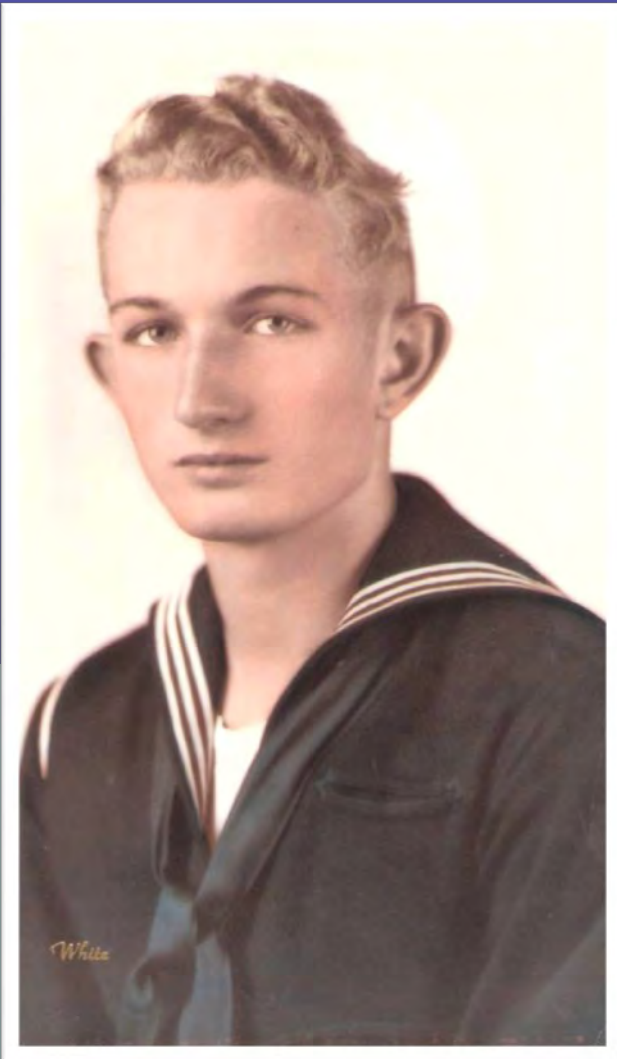
